



President's Message....

Dear members,

As of March 22, 2021, more than 123 million people have been infected by SARS-CoV-2 worldwide and 2.7 million have died from the disease. Now, what about the status of COVID-19 infection in our AOFOG member countries?

The total number of cases in the AOFOG region was 17,940,640, which is 14.6% of the cases in the world. The top three countries with the highest number of cases are India, Indonesia and Israel, which account for 70% of the total morbidity in the AOFOG region. On the other hand, the number of deaths in the AOFOG region is 283,475, which is 10.4% of the deaths in the world. The top three death toll countries in the AOFOG region are India, Indonesia and Pakistan with 213,045,

accounting for 75% of the total deaths in the region. Thus, the case-fatality rate worldwide is 2.2%, but it is as low as 1.6% in our region, and the number of deaths per million people is clearly low in the Asia Oceania Region (Table 1).

But Asia-Oceania is not special. There was a first wave of infection last spring and many countries in our region are currently experiencing a second wave. We are worried about future trends.

Changes in mortality during the 1918 influenza pandemic appear to be very suggestive in predicting the future of COVID-19 cases. At that time, it was difficult to grasp the number of infected cases, and only the transition of the number of deaths remained in the record. Surprisingly, this is consistent with the pattern of changes in the prevalence of COVID-19. All that was possible at that time was to isolate the patient, use a mask, and wash hands. Today, in addition to the same classic precautions, the actions we should take (i.e., avoiding 3 Cs and disinfection, etc.) are repeatedly announced through the media. Nevertheless, we experienced exactly the same or much higher second wave as in 1918 pandemic.

Recently, SARS-CoV-2 variants have been attracting attention. The UK, South African, and Brazilian types have already been identified and have already begun to spread around the world. Many of the recent cases are thought to be infected by these variants. Why are we so concerned about variants? Because the mutation of N501Y and D641G in the Spike protein relates to increased transmissibility and E484K of the Spike protein affects immune evasion. This suggests that variants may be more infectious, weaken the host immune system and make the vaccine less effective.



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Then, will we have a next wave? The 1918 pandemic came with a third wave, though not as high as the second one. Now the last 100 years of achievements and progress since 1918 in the medical world are seeing, how much the vaccine can suppress this third wave and how much new medicine can decrease the number of deaths. I hope that the preventive effect of the vaccine and the therapeutic effect of the new drug will be successful, and that in the near future there will be a daily life without fear of COVID-19.

With the continuation of the pandemic most of us have accepted the situation and adapted to live with it and proceed with our activities though not as usual but taking all the health precautions. Lifestyles and practices have changed.

We are unable to conduct conferences in person face to face yet. Fortunately, we have been able to continue our academic educational programmes through the virtual platform. Telemedicine has come to the forefront and this may be the way forward in medicine in the future. It also has its obstacles, as telemedicine is not familiar to all of us, and not been available to everyone.

During the last quarter due to the seasonal and New Year holidays, we were able to conduct only a limited number of programmes.

1. Completed Activities

a) Webinar on "Elimination of Cervical Cancer in AOFOG Region".

In keeping with the "Global call for action towards the elimination of cervical cancer" by WHO Director -General, Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus on May 2018 and the adoption of a resolution at the World Health Assembly on 17th Nov 2020 by 194 countries committing themselves to eliminate cervical cancer, AOFOG oncology Committee Chaired by Prof. Sarikapan organized a Webinar on 'Elemination of Cervical cancer in the AOFOG region" on the 9th of Jan 2021 as the first event for this year. <u>Read more...</u>



b) 29th International Scientific Conference of OGSB –

Conference was held on 19-20 & 26-27 March 2021 on a virtual platform. Prof. Kazunori Ochiai delivered a plenary lecture titled, "Global Health Threats in COVID-19 pandemic-Past, present & future". It was very informative and appreciated by all. AOFOG also conducted a Plenary Session on "Telemedicine in the Covid-19 era and beyond". Here Dr. Jaydeep Tank speaking on "Telemedicine overview - more than the telephone: Scope, Potential and Reality", presented the scope of telemedicine in this COVID-19 era where face to face consultations had to be minimized, its advantages and the problems faced when using telemedicine. Then Dr. Susan Fleming & Dr. Ruth Large from New Zealand spoke on the "Telemedicine - Experience from New Zealand", giving an insight to the value of telemedicine during this COVID-19 pandemic and the lock down period. Lastly Dr. Sabrina Jabeen from OGSB spoke on, "Leveraging Telemedicine for Sexual and Reproductive Health" where she outlined a study done on Telemedicine in Bangladesh. This very successful session was concluded after an interesting question and answer session.

I wish to thank Prof. Sameena Chowdhury, President OGSB and Prof. Saleha Begum, Secretary General OGSB for incorporating an AOFOG session in their annual congress and Dr. Jaydeep Tank for organizing and coordinating the session.

c) Webinar in Association with the Obstetrics & Gynaecology Society of Singapore (OGSS). -

Web CME titled "Patient care & safety in Pre & Post COVID-19 era", was conducted by the AOFOG Maternal & Fetal Medicine Committee in association with Obstetrics & Gynaecology Society of Singapore, on the 28th of March 2021. Following the opening remarks given by the AOFOG President, Prof. Kazunori Ochiai, Prof. Sir Sabaratnam Arulkumaran, Hon. Fellow AOFOG, Past President FIGO, RCOG & BMA, delivered a very informative, comprehensive Key note address on "COVID Pandemic-Light is at the end of the tunnel". Prof Arulkumaran in his address compared the present pandemic and the previous pandemic and in keeping with the title of the lecture he gave everyone much hope by showing how the vaccination programme would help in controlling the situation. Messages from COVID-19 Advisory Group

24th March 2021

Dear members,

The pandemic of COVID-19 with the official name of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) started in Wuhan, China in late December 2019. The first COVID-19 case outside China was reported in Thailand on 13th January 2020.

As of 24th March 2021, there were 124,986,300 reported coronavirus cases with 2,749,174 deaths affecting 221 countries or states globally, (<u>https://www.worldometers.info/coronavirus/</u>).

As of 21st March 2021, a total of 403,269,879 vaccine doses have been administered, (https://covid19.who.int/)

Among 28 members of AOFOG, as of 22nd March 2021, five members with the highest number of COVID-19 cases are India (11,746,775), Indonesia (1,476,452), Israel (829,832), Philippines (684,311) and Pakistan (637,042). Five members with the lowest number of COVID-19 cases are Macau (48), Laos People's Democratic Republic (49), Brunei (206), Timor-Leste (372) and Bhutan (870).

Two very important issues that we would like to inform our AOFOG members in this AOFOG Newsletter include:

1) Caring for women with COVID-19 during and after pregnancy:

The most update WHO COVID-19 Living Guideline 25 January 2021 (<u>https://www.who.int/publications/i/item/WHO-2019-nCoV-clinical-2021-1</u>) has made the following recommendations:

- a) All pregnant women with history of contact with a person with confirmed COVID-19 be carefully monitored considering asymptomatic transmission of COVID-19.
- b) Pregnant or recently pregnant women with suspected or confirmed mild COVID-19 may not require acute care in hospital, unless there is concern for rapid deterioration or an inability to promptly return to hospital; but isolation to contain virus transmission is recommended, and can be done at a health facility, community facility or at home, according to established COVID-19 care pathways.
- c) Pregnant or recently pregnant women with moderate or severe COVID-19 require acute care in the hospital, as there is concern for rapid deterioration that may warrant supportive care for severe respiratory morbidity; and/or interventions to improve maternal and fetal survival.
- d) Pregnant and recently pregnant women with suspected, probable or confirmed COVID-19, should have access to woman-centred, respectful skilled care, including midwifery, obstetric, fetal medicine and neonatal care, as well as mental health and psychosocial support, with readiness to care for maternal and neonatal complications.
- e) Mode of birth should be individualized, based on obstetric indications and the woman's preferences. WHO recommends that induction of labour and caesarean section should only be undertaken when medically justified and based on maternal and fetal conditions. COVID-19 positive status alone is not an indication for caesarean section.
- f) Pregnant and recently pregnant women who have recovered from COVID-19 and been released from the COVID-19 care pathway, should be enabled and encouraged to receive routine antenatal, postpartum, or postabortion care, as appropriate. Additional care should be provided if there are any complications.
- Mothers with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 should be encouraged to initiate and continue breastfeeding. g) From the available evidence, mothers should be counselled that the benefits of breast-feeding substantially outweigh the potential risks of transmission. The most recent WHO document (https://www.who.int/news/item/16-03-2021-new-research-highlights-risks-of-separating-newborns-frommothers-during-covid-19-pandemic) also indicates that keeping mothers and babies together could save more than 125,000 lives.

2) COVID-19 vaccination for pregnant and lactating women:

- a) FIGO 2nd March 2021 (<u>https://www.figo.org/covid-19-vaccination-pregnant-and-breastfeeding-women</u>)
 FIGO considers that there are no risks actual or theoretical that would outweigh the potential benefits of vaccination for pregnant women. FIGO supports offering COVID-19 vaccination to pregnant and breastfeeding women.
- b) Public Health England (<u>https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-vaccination-women-of-childbearing-age-currently-pregnant-planning-a-pregnancy-or-breastfeeding/covid-19-vaccination-a-guide-for-women-of-childbearing-age-pregnant-planning-a-pregnancy-or-breastfeeding</u>) (updated 1 March 2021) indicated that "The vaccines have not yet been tested in pregnancy, so until more information is available, those who are pregnant should not routinely have this vaccine. Non-clinical evidence is required before any clinical studies in pregnancy can start, and before that, it is usual to not recommend routine vaccination during pregnancy."
- ACOG: (<u>https://www.acog.org/clinical/clinical-guidance/practice-advisory/articles/2020/12/vaccinating-pregnant-and-lactating-patients-against-covid-19</u>) Last updated March 4, 2021.
 ACOG recommends that COVID-19 vaccines should not be withheld from pregnant individuals. COVID-19 vaccines should be offered to lactating individuals similar to non-lactating individuals.
- d) WHO: In the interim, pregnant women should receive COVID-19 vaccine only if the benefit of vaccination to the pregnant woman outweighs the potential vaccine risks, such as if the woman is a health worker at high risk of exposure or has comorbidities that place them in a high-risk group for severe COVID-19. This applies to either Janssen vaccine (Ad26.COV2.S) (<u>https://www.who.int/publications/i/item/WHO-2019-nCoV-vaccines-SAGE-recommendation-Ad26.COV2.S-2021.1</u>) or the AZD1222 (ChAdOx1-S (recombinant)) vaccine against COVID-19 developed by Oxford University and AstraZeneca (<u>https://www.who.int/publications/i/item/WHO-2019-nCoV-vaccines-SAGE_recommendation-AZD1222-2021.1</u>).

Although more than 400 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines has been administered globally as well as many other enormous resources that have been spent, many countries in our AOFOG still have to work very hard in controlling COVID-19 pandemic situation. On behalf of AOFOG, we wish you all the best for fighting with this devastating COVID-19 pandemic.

The webinar was well attended with over 400 participants.

Our statement, 'COVID-19 and Gynaecological Cancers: Asia and Oceania Federation of Obstetrics and Gynecology (AOFOG) Oncology Committee Opinion' was published in the Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology Research on 1st March 2021.

Future activities

Dr. Ai Ling Tan has represented the AOFOG Oncology Committee in the Fiji Webinar, 'OB-GYN ultrasound: Impact on Clinical Decisions II' holding by AOFOG Ultrasound Committee on 21st March 2021, and will responsible for a talk on 'Ovarian tumor - simplifying ultrasound interpretation of images --- management'.

The AOFOG will also participate in the 28th Congress of the Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Malaysia, 23rd - 25th July 2021, and the 7th Biennial meeting of ASGO, 25th - 27th November 2021. Further details will be announced in due course.

Report from MIGS Committee

Our Committee contributed a revision of "AOFOG statement on COVID-19 and Minimal Invasive Gynecologic Surgery", released on March 1st 2021. This revision was made on the WHO statement for living guidance issued on this January. Further revision will be issued around this summer after most health care providers would receive vaccination.
